

MR OMLOR DEAD

Jacob Omler, Well Known Farmer, Succumbed Last Evening

AFTER SHORT ILLNESS; Due to Hemorrhages from Ulcers-Funeral Services Monday.

The death of Jacob Omlor, well known farmer living south of the city, which occurred at 6:30 o'clock last evening, came after a very short illness, the exact nature of which was unknown until revealed by the autopsy, which was held last night. He suffered severe hemorrhage at the last and practically bled to death from two ulcers, one of which was located just above the stomach and the other just below. No cancerous condition was found.

Mr. Omlor had been complaining of pain in the stomach and back for a period of about two years, from time to time, his condition grew worse in the past two months, not, however, being such that it greatly inconvenienced him, until Monday, when he became bedfast. On Wednesday, his condition took a sudden turn for the worse, the hemorrhages which quickly resulted in his death ensuing.

Mr. Omlor's death occurred on the farm where he had lived for more than fifty years, being the old Omlor homestead, and representing the work of two generations of the family. Mr. Omlor was born in Fostoria, O., January 1, 1861, and at death was fifty-eight years old. Residing in this city, four years, they went to the country where they took possession of a tract of land which grew in productiveness, under careful skill, and which the parents later turned over to the son, Jacob Omlor, when they came to this city in 1877.

Mr. Omlor was married in 1887 to Miss Mary Hains. They went to housekeeping on the farm which Mr. Omlor's death now occurred, although they made plans to move to this city within a short time, having purchased the Rademaker homestead on Third street for this purpose.

The wife and ten children survive. They are [note that ten children are not listed]: Margaret, wife of Caspar Miller; Gertrude, wife of Clem Colchin; Agnes, wife of Edward Rumschlag; Edward, Lawrence, returned from military service, Bert (sic) and Francis. The son, Lawrence, returned from military service in France only about two weeks ago.

The parents died a number of years ago. There are one sister and one brother living, being Mrs. J.E. Keller, of this city, and Charles Omlor, of Hammond.

Mr. Omler was a member of St. Marys Catholic church, of the Knights of Columbus and the St. Joseph society. The funeral will be Monday morning at 9:30 from the St. Marys Catholic church, with burial in the St. Marys Catholic church (sic), with burial in the St. Joseph cemetery."
