The church was beautifully decorated with ferns, Easter lilies and candles. Miss Ida Hirschy played the Lohengrin wedding march. Charles Sharp, cousin of the bride, sang, "I Love You Truly" and Mrs. Sharp and daughter, Florence, sang "In the Garden of My Heart".

The bride wore a beautiful white satin dress of ankle length with footwear to match and a head band of orange buds and blossoms. She carried a bouquet of white lilies and (crease)....close friend of the bride, was bridesmaid. She wore a yellow organdie dress with white footwear. She carried a bouquet of yellow Easter flowers.
