CRASH INJURIES CLAIM LIFE OF DECATUR MAN

DECATUR - William C. Hosea, 57, of Decatur, died at 1:37 p.m. Saturday in Lutheran

Hospital, Fort Wayne, of injuries received Sept. 19 on U.S. 27, five miles north of Decatur. He had been critical since the accident.

Investigating authorities reported a car driven by Richard Hormann, 45, of Fort Wayne, struck the rear of a car driven by Thomas Crowl, 19, of Fort Wayne, and the impact shoved the Crowl auto over the center line and into a head-on crash with the Hosea car. Hosea, who had just attended a two-week school in Seattle, Wash., was en route home at the time of the accident.

After the accident, a semi trailer truck driven by Larry Baumgartner of Decatur struck the Hosea and Crowl autos as Baumgartner was unable to get his truck off the highway to avoid the wreckage.

The only other injury was to Crowl, who received knee lacerations.
