

## **Del Palmer, 83, retired horseman, claimed by death.**

Portland, Ind., Feb. 25. --- George Adelbert (Del) Palmer, 83, retired horseman, died in his sleep sometime Friday night at his home here. Mr. Palmer during his youth was a circus acrobat and tumbler. He was also a trainer of performing horses for circuses, proprietor of a livery stable and a harness, buggy and carriage store, breeder of fast horses and owner of a racing stable, nationally known in equine circles as a dealer and judge and in later years operated a music store. He retired from active business in 1930.

A cerebral hemorrhage was given as the cause of his death. Surviving is one son, Harry Palmer, of Crawfordsville. Funeral services will be held at the Baird chapel at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon with Rev. T. O. M. Wills, Presbyterian pastor, in charge. Burial will be in Green Park cemetery.
