
Death Summons Comes Suddenly To Clem Wilson

Clem Wilson, 61, city clerk-treasurer for the past twenty-eight years, passed away suddenly Thursday evening as he was walking from the city building to his home at 416 East Votaw. Just as he reached the intersection of North and Wayne streets, he suffered a heart attack and before a physician could be summoned God's finger touched him and his spirit had winged its way to that celestial world.

The announcement of the passing of Clem Wilson came as a sorrowful thunderbolt to every citizen of the community.

He may not have been in best of health but Thursday he was at his post of duty – a daily task he loyally performed for more than a score of year. Duties are mortal - event's are God's and death for this respected public servant is now his crown of life.



Clem Wilson was born in Portland, so of the late Joseph B and Mary (Drake) Wilson. He began his public service in 1914 when he became deputy auditor of Jay county under John Bonifas. In addition to the sister, he is survived by one brother, Charles, who had assisted him in the clerk's office for a number of years.

He was a member of the Portland lodge, Loyal Order of Moose.

The body was removed to the Baird funeral home where friends may call to pay their respects.

Funeral services will be conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Baird Chapel in charge of Rev. I. L. Curts. Interment will follow in Green Park cemetery.
