Mary Finch Ehrhart was born in Columbia County, Ohio, April 5, 1827 and departed this life at her home near Salamonia, Jay County Ind January 17, 1902, aged 74 years 9 months and 12 days.

She was married to Timothy Ehrhart January 24, 1846. This union was blessed with nine children-three boys and six girls. Two boys and two girls still survive.

She moved with her husband from Columbiana Co., Ohio to this county in 1853 and settled upon the farm, where she lived constantly until the day of her death.
