

Albert Ulysses Rupel, twenty-five, died Saturday night at his home in Jackson Township after three days of the most intense suffering. On Saturday, August 12, he was engaged in some repair work about the barn on his farm just east of Wall in Jackson Township, when he happened to step upon a rusty nail. The bit of steel pierced deeply into the flesh of his heel, but a physician was called from Bryant and the wound was given the needed medical attention. The wound was apparently well cleansed and dressed and to appearances was healing when on last Thursday night at 3 o'clock tetanus or lockjaw developed.

The young man was the second oldest son of Isaac and Martha Chamness Rupel and a grandson of Ebenezer Chamness. His marriage to Miss Minnie E. Lewis, daughter of Emery T. Lewis, a well-known farmer of Penn Township, occurred only three months since, May 22, and he and his wife had one of the most neatly furnished homes in Jackson Township.

Funeral services were held and interment was at Twin Hills Cemetery.
