Newell Lamb

Judge Newell Alexander Lamb, 78, retired Newton County Circuit Court Judge, passed away on Wednesday, March 30, 1988 at 12:10 p.m. (CST) at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester, Minn. Death was unexpected although he had been in declining health for four months.

Judge Lamb was born on October 31, 1909 in Chicago, Ill. He grew up in St. Charles, Ill. Graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1934 with a Bachelor of Science degree. He received a Bachelor of Law degree from Wisconsin Law School in 1935 and a Doctorate of Law degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1966.

He began his law career in 1935 when he joined the law firm of Hansen & Sauttoff in Madison, Wis. Judge Lamb was elected Justice of the Peace for Madison that same year. He also worked for the Wisconsin State Industrial Commission from 1936 to 1940 before moving to Kentland.

From 1940 to 1944 he served as the Kentland Town Attorney, Newton County Attorney, Newton County Prosecuting Attorney and Appeals Attorney for the Selective Service System in Newton County. He was elected judge in 1944 and served seven terms before retiring on January 1, 1987.

Judge Lamb received a citation

for outstanding judicial service from the Judicial Conference of Indiana.

Lamb was a member of the Trinity United Methodist Church, Indiana and Wisconsin Bar Association, Newton Lodge 361 F&AM Indianapolis Valley, Scottish Rite Marot Temple Shrine and Hazelden Country Club.

He served as Grand Master of the Indiana Masonic Lodge from 1953-54 and was chairman of the Indiana Masonic Home Board. He was twice named Sagamore of the Wabash and was named honorary Secretary of State and Honorary Lt. Governor of the State of Indiana. In addition he was listed in Who's Who in American Law.

On November 10, 1935 he was married in Madison to Jeanette (Jackie) Comley who survives. Other survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Paul R. (Susan) Linn of Louisville, Kentucky and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted on Monday, April 4 at 2 p.m. at the Trinity United Methodist Church in Kentland with the Rev. Louis Reynolds and Dr. Richard Moore officiating. Entombment was at the Fowler Cemetery.
